MEMORIES

There was the boy who arrived home from school with his mouth firmly covered with a wide band of sticking plaster — punishment for talking too much in class.

Another boy was determined to climb to the very top of one of the large pine trees at the rear of the school. He succeeded but alas, the top branch broke under his weight — crashing all the way down through the tree until he managed to break his fall on the last branch.

Two girls were not opening their mouths wide enough during their singing lesson — a large upright cork between their teeth for the rest of the lesson soon taught them to sing loud and clear.

As I sit here trying to remember my days at St Joseph's School I find my earliest memories are of Sr Gabriel who taught the juniors. Even before I started school in 1947 I knew she was a kind person who was loved by her pupils. At the age of four I sent in a sample of my cooking — rock cakes, which lived up to their name!

Plastacine, crayons, chalk on the blackboard and hot cups of cocoa come to mind. And then there was the Government apples for a little while. I don't know if I have ever forgiven that boy who took a bite out of my apple which I only ate after his bite was cut out! Sr Gabriel knew how to cope with such a crisis.

The bus kids were always late to school as we had to walk from the Public School which seemed to be miles away from St Joseph's on those cold frosty mornings.

In the summer Fr Greg took us swimming to the river or the baths. I think twenty seven was the biggest number of kids he squeezed into his car.

Schooldays at St Joseph's were for me full of small memories which in modern times may seem trivial, however, as a pupil in the mid-1940's these memories are nevertheless still very much cherished.

For us girls the playing area was between the school and hall and along the track between the pines, where we were close to Sister's watchful eye. Our games were mostly rounders, basketball and skipping with long ropes, all carried out in our uniforms complete with those awful long woollen stockings.

The boys on the other hand were segregated from us and had to walk over Gall Street and cross the stile to the big reserve where there were acorn trees together with a much bigger area for their games of football, tag, cowboys and indians games, hide and seek etc.

Sometimes if Sister was called to the Convent or was busy inside marking school books, us girls would leave our playing area, run down the track, past the ornamental shrubs, crossing two fences, and so to the area where the boys were playing. There was of course nothing improper with our furtive behaviour, but to ourselves the expeditions seemed dare-devil.

En route near to the pine trees at the back of the Convent we would sometimes see deck chairs comfortably placed in the sun. These were not for the Sisters to use surely? Weren't they meant to be holy, pray, and work, and not enjoy themselves? Such were the thoughts of thirteen-year-olds at the time!!

When lunch was almost over the school bell would clang out it's reminder that we were due back in class, there was then a hurried retreat back from the boys' playground via the track and pine trees to our own area, and so into the classroom. We assured ourselves that Sister did not notice our hot flushed faces nor the puffing which announced our arrival. Sister didn't know, or did she? The thought of the possible dreaded punishment of having to weed the Sister's driveway was of course one deterrent to any form of misbehaviour, but this did not prevent our acts of great daring at play time.

SR FRANCIS'S TOFFEE

I was one of those kids from the 'public school' but I know I loved that Toffee as much as all the 'Convent' kids.

This beautifully twisted length of creamy, chewy toffee at a penny a piece, each individually wrapped, still makes my mouth water. No other toffee recipe has ever reached the standard that Sr Francis set I am quite sure.

It was evidently a great sight to watch her making the toffee — kneading a large mound like a loaf of bread to the right consistency, then pulling and twisting each piece ready to be wrapped.

Her toffee was well known and sold as far away as Timaru and no doubt provided a little income for the Sisters. I know it was the first item 'sold out' on Paddy's Market days which I remember being held in the Convent grounds, a day always looked forward to by the Parish and the wider community.

Music and singing obviously played a large part in the school life of St Joseph's judging by the many stories told to the writer.

Another is of a boy who just could not sing in tune at all, so was told never to utter a sound but to MOUTH the words of the songs!

Others remember the Rugby field being prepared and the harrows being pulled by Verdon Wall's truck — quite a sight to young children.

- . . . Then there was the Nor-wester that blew the play-shed roof off!
- . . . And the repeated hours trying to rid the tennis court of mushrooms.
- . . . Bunzie and Cheezy had a rather large helping of buns and cheese on the way home from school at the home of one of their parents, hence the nick-names that have remained to this day.

What a job it was for the older boys to mow the Convent lawns with an old push mower and chopping the Sisters wood.

The school floors were highly polished, by the children, and we had to change into slippers before entering the classrooms.

Adding to "A Brief History of the School", did you know that of the two rooms of the school, one was intended for the boys and one for the girls with the folding door in between which could be opened up for social purposes. [The mind boggles].

We presume this must have been an idea of Fr Gallagher's because the men always sat on one side of the Church and the ladies the other.

Senior girls every Friday had to clean the Church Brass and lay out the Vestments in perfect order ready for the Priest to 'step into' for Sunday Mass.

Our school day finished with 5 decades of the Rosary, said in front of that beautiful statue of Mary, during the months of Our Lady, May and October.

Memories of the basketball court played on in it's natural state, i.e. not sealed, are vivid, as are play and lunch breaks spent weeding school and convent gardens and driveway — not as punishment — but to foster pride in their surroundings and to probably reduce the risk of idleness leading to mischief!

A former pupil went to Ireland and met Sr Patrick's sister who was also a nun. When asked by someone there what Sr Patrick was like, he was told, "Be gorra, you were lucky, this one here was \S !!!

SOME RECOLLECTIONS OF THE FAIRLIE CONVENT

In 1939 when the school opened, we were living at Sherwood Downs, and the fact that the school bus began running that year and the Sherwood School closed made it possible for me to attend St Joseph's. The fact that we went by bus was in itself a novelty for us.

I have not any clear memories of the first day, but I know that the school commenced a little later than the public school. I can remember the classroom where I sat, and of course I can remember Sr Rosalie.

I think perhaps my most vivid memory of my first years is that spelling was very important. To this day I associate the word 'eyes' with Stds 1 and 2. I am not sure of the methods used to instil the spelling.

The bottle of milk each day, and also apples at one period. The bottle of milk was made into cocoa in the winter, and the bus children had an additional cup of cocoa on arrival at school during the winter. There was also Sr Francis' toffee which sold at three pieces a penny. It was very popular and brought in a lot of money for the Holy Childhood.

I can remember Sr Agnes taking us for sewing from Std 3 up. The first thing we made was a sewing bag, then our cooking apron and cap. We also did spinning and weaving as a war effort.

One thing that still stands out vividly in my memory is the Thursday afternoon cooking classes in Forms 1 and 2. One afternoon was theory, the other was practical. One theory afternoon three of us set out from school to go to the Main School when we decided we would take the afternoon off, thinking we would not be missed. We went to the park and had a free afternoon, and an ice-cream and made our way back to the buses at the usual time. There we were informed that we were missed, and that when they sent someone round to the convent we were not to be found. We made a pact that if it was wet the next day we would not go to school. It was wet and I am sure my mother wondered why I said I would stay home that day, as I never missed school, rain or snow. On the following Monday we rubbed onion into our hands as a remote preparation, but then at playtime I went for my music lesson and I had to wait until lunchtime to take my medicine. My two companions were Dorothy Whyte and Pauline Black. I might note that it was not my idea but I went along willingly and shouted the ice-cream, as I had just had a birthday.

In 1943 we shifted to Ashwick Flat, and the Ashwick School had also closed by that date. Dorothy Whyte, George Jones and myself rode our horses to the monument corner and left them in a fenced off area there. We really had a lot of fun on the way home from school, and did lots of things that would not have been approved of. We were joined at the bus stop by the Ben Jones' children so were able to play all sorts of games while waiting for the bus.

I began learning the piano as soon as school started, and I now have many lovely memories of Sr Agnes and her concern for me, not always to do with music. She always tried to make me toe the line, and if I had done anything wrong she always let me know. From the very first day at school I always took a bottle of cream for the Sisters. There were no plastic bags in those days and the bottle often leaked. As a result my music books in particular often had a greasy look!

My years at the Convent were very happy and I am very grateful to Sisters Serenus, Rosalie, Agnes, John and Francis for the fundamentals of education which they gave me.




Many parents and pupils kept in touch with Sister after her return to Auckland until the time of her death in April, 1988.









The "Oompa-Loompas", the chocolate factory workers, were a delightful group who provided a lot of humour in the show. Their verse speaking was of a high standard.

On the musical side, the performance began with an overture played by a recorder group who showed skill in coping with some difficult note changing. The chorus singing was clear and tuneful and there were two excellent solos by Christopher Lea and John O'Neill.

The stage manager, Karl Prosser [standard four], did a great job in organising his adult stage hands, and the 11 scene changes were handled speedily and efficiently.

Attractive costuming, simple sets, good organisation, bright singing and dancing and well rehearsed children add up to a very good show. Well done St Joseph's. —A.J.K.
